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COMPARATIVE LINGUISTICS AND LINGUISTIC TRANSLATION THE ANALYSIS OF THEORIES ON PRAGMATIC SETS

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Annotation: Before addressing the topic of pragmatic sets let's pay attention to what pragmatics. Generally pragmatics (Greek word "pragmatos" -motion) is a field of linguistics and semiotics concerned that with the use of language in social contexts and the ways people produce and comprehend meaning through language. First the term of pragmatics was coined by American linguist Ch.Pierce and later Ch.Morris developed this theory and coined the term pragmatics into linguistics.

Pragmatics can be observed due to social contexts in the form of speeches made by humans. There is no exact form or mould for linguistic pragmatics: and it includes some components like subject, addressor, relations interactions and others.

For example the following matter can be studied in relation to the subject of the pech: obvious and hidden intentions of expression (delivery of message, request, imperative, promise, advice, apology, congratulation, complaint etc.):types of speech manners, conversations, it's rules, intention of the speaker, comprehension of the listener about current topic and his interests, Outlook and the speakers' own attitude Pragmatics. impression not only deal with the social relation between the speaker and listener but also investigates the matters that involves situational context. Pragmatic ideas are widely used in IT, machinery, security systems and other fields of technology.

Pragamtics—is the styles of expressions and comprehensions the language usage in situational contexts. The term pragmatics is coined by American linguist Ch. Morris in 1930 and the followers of pragmatics began to appear in the late 1970s.

"The pragmatics mainly focus on the style and the manner of the speaker in relation to situation rather than the meaning of the sentence or core of the collacations" (Geoffrey Finch, Linguistic terms and concepts, Palgrave Macmillan, 200)

Pragmatics and the characteristics of the human speech

--I saw an old Irish man and his son in the toilet And I thiught that there were enough space for both of them. There is no any nonsense there. They had waited for me.(1992: 65)

What did his words mean there? Usually the first part of the talks is obscure and you can understand the sentence by reading the next part of the talk and this can be considered as pragmatics.

About alternative definitions of pragmatics:

The ideas of pragmatics mean every single unit of things and this is nonsense for pragmatics. We studied some differences and limits in pragmatics. Those definitions still exist in linguistics which pragmatics are generally equalized with language comprehension. As we stated above, although, they are hard to notice the conception of pragmatics can be the same. For instance, the examples of pragmatics which can be

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connected with the coded aspects of language may be less in number than those which don't include those aspects, as the principles of language usage sometimes can be used as the principles of translation or can break the grammar rules of that language. As a result, we can conclude taht there is a close realtionship between pragmatical meaning and grammatical theories. From this point there are so mnay definitions for pragmatics.
