
THE ROLE OF INTER-PERSONAL RELATIONSHIP IN THE FORMATION OF ALTRUIST BEHAVIOR IN THE FAMILY

Annotation:

The development of the phenomenon of altruism in the psyche of children under the influence of the family environment is carried out in the family with the help of theoretical and practical skills of adults. In the socialization of the individual, this phenomenon is widely considered to be a concern for others

Theoretical and experimental study of the phenomenon of altruism shows that while this socially significant phenomenon is determined by the fact that an individual is focused on helping someone or a group of people impartially, his motivation is to care about other people will be.

Altruistic orientation is a lifelong trait that is not determined by age. Altruistic orientation depends not only on the individuality of the individual, but also on the environment in which he lives, the family and the social environment in general. In our society today, there are more complex and contradictory views on social behavior. This is because we do not know what personality traits are associated with altruism, as altruism is a complex multi-stage trait and its aspects include;

- Motivational contact - the influence of internal factors on the quality of power that affect the external behavior and goals of the person;
- the emotional component is manifested as empathy, grief, fear, guilt and conscience;
- knowledge of the norms and requirements of the cognitive component society, as well as thinking about courageous actions;
- the interdependence of the personal component, the system of values associated with altruism, self-esteem and other individual characteristics of the person;
- Behavioral components, helping people in need through concrete actions.

The questionnaire consisted of two parts, the first part of the passport, which included the test taker's age, gender, "procedural" and "outcome", "altruism" and "selfishness."

In the second main part, a 10-question questionnaire was created to help identify altruistic education.

The results show that the answers to the questions of the above questionnaire are 5.12% higher than the answers of the female respondents compared to the female respondents, and the answers of the female respondents are 2.56% higher than the answers to the other respondents. It was observed that the responses of female respondents were 20.64% higher than those of male respondents.

The responses of the respondents also show that the methods of parenting in the family need to be adjusted. Recognizing the need and value of altruism, modern parents are reluctant to communicate with their children in a non-judgmental way. According to parents, the life of an altruist is difficult, and in practice there are concepts that create the misconception that altruism is a negative trait.

Due to the lack of research on the formation of altruism in the family, today there are more and more aggressive, selfish people. It is worth noting that interpersonal relationships in the family play an important role in the development of the individual, as the child begins to gain life experience about the environment, social skills and abilities for the first time under the guidance of parents. However, it allows us to observe the peculiarities of the formation of the child's personality altruistic orientation, explains the role and importance of this feature in human life relationships.
